SHOW ENTRY RULES

1. ORCHIDFÊTE is an American Orchid Society sanctioned show, complying with the current rules in the AOS HANDBOOK ON JUDGING AND EXHIBITION and interim rules issued by the AOS Committee on Awards.
2. Each exhibitor agrees upon making an entry to abide by the rules of this show.
3. Any question regarding the interpretation or application of these rules and regulations shall be referred to the Show Committee whose decision shall be final.
4. Entries not in accordance with the schedule will be disqualified.
5. The Show Committee reserves the right to remove inferior exhibits or any part of them.
6. No entries will be accepted for judging after 9:00 p.m. Friday.
Subsequent entries will be exhibited but not ribbon judged.
7. All displays must be completed by midnight as the display room will be locked thereafter.
8. Only authorized persons will be permitted in the show area while judging is in progress.
9. The appropriate class for intergeneric hybrids shall be the first class listed for such hybrids which includes one of the genera making up the hybrid. e.g. Epilaelia – Epidendrum x Laelia or Laelia x Epidendrum. Class 11 (Epidendrum intergeneric hybrids) comes before class 14a (Laelia intergeneric hybrids) so for an Epilaelia class 11 is correct. A list of genera belonging in each class will be available at the registration desk.
10. No plants can be entered in more than one class.
11. An entry in any of classes 1 to 6 may also be registered in class 7 (Visiting Society Exhibit) if it qualifies.
12. All items entered for judging must be officially entered by class using an ORCHIDFÊTE entry form. (Cut flowers and flowering plants will be considered equally in judging.)
13. All entry tags must be removed from exhibits when judging is completed and before the show is open to the public.
14. In the event that the exhibitor of cut flowers cannot be present, the Show Committee will display the material to the best advantage.
15. Materials will be returned at the exhibitor's expense if return is required. Unclaimed exhibits, without instructions for disposal, will be handled as the Show Committee sees fit.

16. There are no fees to the exhibitor for entries or assistance in the preparation of exhibits.
17. Tables for exhibitors will be furnished without costs. However, cloth, foliage plants, etc., must be furnished by the exhibitor. Please note that although the floors in the exhibition area are not carpeted, we do not have a hotel staff that is going to clean the show areas prior to the show. We would ask that you clean your areas after set up and following the show.
18. Any lighting used for effect is the responsibility of and must be furnished by the exhibitor, and must be subject to approval by the set-up committee. Effect lighting that distorts colour may be turned off during judging.
19. No artificial plants or foliage may be used to supplement exhibits. Artificial grass may be used only as floor covering. Orchids are to be the only flowering plants in the displays, except for corsages and arrangements in both of which orchids must predominate.
20. Plants and cut flowers exhibited for competition must be correctly and legibly labeled, without the name of the owner until judging is completed. No dyed or touched-up flowers will be permitted.
21. Exhibits must remain intact until 5:00 p.m. Sunday, whether or not plants in the exhibit have been sold.
22. Shipments of exhibit materials to be displayed for the owner by the Show Committee must be shipped to the CÉGEP André-Laurendeau, C/O the Eastern Canada Orchid Society, to arrive no later than 3 p.m. Friday.
23. All cards displaying exhibitor's names will be provided by the Show Committee. No other signs will be permitted.
24. There will be 5 or more American Orchid Society Judges presiding over the judging and their decisions shall be final.
25. First, second, third place ribbons may be awarded in each class at the discretion of the judges. Rosettes and/or trophies will be awarded as designated. Judges have the authority to award or withhold any prize and may sub-divide any class where warranted.
26. In addition to the ribbons and/or trophies awarded by the judges, plants and flowers may be considered for American Orchid Society awards. Each exhibitor by entering an exhibit agrees to accept any award given and pay the fees for such awards to the American Orchid Society (currently \$40 US for AOS members or \$60 US for non-members).
NOTE: If the exhibitor does not wish to accept any such awards, the exhibitor must so indicate in the AOS JUDGING column on the entry form. Plants that have previously been exhibited for AOS judging on the same inflorescence are not eligible for AOS awards and should be marked "N".
27. To be eligible for a cultural award (e.g. best specimen) the plant must have been the property of the exhibitor for at least 6 months.

28. Commercial growers wishing to sell orchids at the show must enter a quality exhibit of flowering plants in categories 2, 3 or 4, or at least 6 cut inflorescences in category 5.
29. No sales tables shall be allowed in the exhibition area. No commercial activity or advertising by unauthorized persons shall be permitted.
30. All exhibits in the art section must be the work of the exhibitor.
31. Neither the CÉGEP du Vieux Montréal nor the Eastern Canada Orchid Society is responsible for loss or damage to any exhibit material or other property of exhibitors. However, every precaution will be exercised for their safety.
32. Reasonable effort will be made to provide the amount of space requested.
33. Judges and clerks are expected to become cognizant with these rules.
34. Exhibitors and vendors are expected to refrain from impolite or unruly behavior.
